## Pair of OIMS Employees Lauded for Heroic Efforts in Cafeteria

"Hero: a person who is admired or idealized for courage, outstanding achievements, or noble qualities."

At the Olean Intermediate Middle School, there are two employees who are definitely heroes. Mrs. Kim Kruse was supervising the OIMS cafeteria when she felt a student grab her arm. He was unable to speak and his face was flushed. Mrs. Kruse immediately assessed the situation, as she had been trained to do during a first aid course taken at a district Staff Development Day. She turned the student around and performed the Heimlich maneuver on him. The item which the student was choking on was expelled from his throat, and he began breathing again. A feeling of relief quickly overcame Mrs. Kruse who was happy that she was able to help.

On another occasion, Mrs. Nancy Marvin was supervising the OIMS cafeteria when a student ran up to her with his hand at his throat, which is automatically seen as a cry for help, "I'm choking!" The look on the student's face was enough for Mrs. Marvin to use the training she had received during her years as a lifeguard to perform the Heimlich maneuver. Mrs. Marvin saw the food dislodge from the student as she assisted him.

On December 4<sup>th</sup>, Mrs. Kruse and Mrs. Marvin were surprised with flowers and certificates of appreciation for their heroic efforts in helping students in need. On hand for the presentation were: Dr. Colleen Taggerty, OCSD Superintendent; Mr. Gerald Trietley, OIMS Principal for grades 6 & 7; and Mr. Joel Whitcher, OIMS Principal for grades 4 & 5. Both district employees were honored for their heroic efforts, but felt they were simiply doing their jobs. Dr. Taggerty, Mr. Trietley, and Mr. Whitcher were happy to be able to recognize the employees' quick, and potentially life-saving, actions.

#### Cafeteria Reminders to Parents; Breakfast Available to Everyone

In addition to the regular breakfast that is available, the High School cafeteria has begun a new breakfast program. Students can come to the cafeteria, using the Fourth Street doors near the gym, for breakfast

beginning at 7:00 a.m. Breakfast items on the menu include fresh baked muffins, breakfast sandwiches, whole wheat Pop-Tarts, cereal and hot chocolate. Come join us to start your day with the most important meal of the day.

#### **Meal Charge Policy**

- ❖ Meal charges will be limited to \$10.00.
- Students with charge balances on their account will become part of the weekly automatic call system for negative balances. Twice monthly a letter will be sent to the home for those charges.
- ❖ After reaching \$10.00 in charges your child will not be eligible to receive a choice of meal from the menu, but will be provided with cereal, juice and milk for breakfast and a sandwich, fruit and milk for lunch until charges are eliminated. Parents will be responsible for the cost of meals distributed in this manner.
- ❖ For you and your child's convenience prepayments will be accepted at your child's school and placed on their account.


#### **VoIP Coming to Olean City Schools**

Not to worry, VoIP is neither the newest strain of flu virus nor the most recent rock band gone viral! It is the new phone system for the district. The acronym VoIP stands for Voice over Internet Protocol and is pronounced "voyp". Yes, phone service over the Internet. Starting in January, 2014, VoIP will be our new voice communications system that uses our data network to make and receive phone calls.

The biggest reason for replacing our current phone system for a newer, more up-to-date one is the availability of (or more precisely, lack of) replacement parts for our current phone system. Replacement parts for the district's current phone system are no longer manufactured and finding needed replacement parts has become increasingly difficult.

The conversion to VoIP began in September with the replacement of all of the switches throughout the district and the addition of the VoIP server to the network. Additionally some new copper lines (called POTS lines) were installed in Olean Intermediate Middle School. New VoIP phones will begin appearing in classroom and offices around the district. The planned cut over to the new VoIP system will occur before Jan. 6, 2014.

All buildings and office phone numbers will remain the same. High School classroom phone numbers will be changed to reflect the renumbering of those classrooms. When parents and community members call the district or building they will notice a few differences. One new addition will be the ability to press a digit and say a department or person's name for quicker connection. Another change that will be instituted is that teacher's extension can be reached during the day; however, the call will go directly to their voice mail.



#### City Code Officer Shares Knowledge with Classes

This year we were able to offer students classes in Residential Construction. Throughout the year, students will be learning about modern construction methods and materials used in the carpentry field. Students will gain hands-on experiences using these methods and materials as well as proper and safe use of tools and equipment. At the present time students have completed detailed drawings of utility sheds that will be constructed in the spring. Scale models of these sheds are also being constructed to show construction methods as well as detailed material list for full size sheds.

Ed Jennings, from the City of Olean Code Enforcement Office, visited two of the Applied Technology classes earlier this fall. Students gained valuable information about building codes and safety issues pertaining to construction and residential structures. Students were able to ask specific questions pertaining to the construction of the sheds and residential structures in general.



Mrs. Katie Wolfgang and Mr. Matt Perry served as the masters of ceremonies for the program, which included interviews with Civil War reenactors who represented the 154th New York "Hardtack" Volun-

teer Regiment and the 42nd Pennsylvania "Bucktail" Volunteer Infantry Regiment, multimedia presentations, student recitations accompanied by the OHS Orchestra under the direction of Mr. Rin Wada, a performance by the OHS Chorus under the direction of Ms. Jan Rhody and finally, the "1,000 Voices" recitation of the entire Gettysburg Address by students and staff from grades 7-12. Later that day, a small ceremony was held at the Civil War Veteran's Memorial in Lincoln Park where students placed a wreath, and members of the Allegany American Legion Ritual Team performed a 21-gun salute.

Joshua Chamberlain, the Union hero who won the Congressional Medal of Honor for the defense of *Little Round Top* on the second day of fighting at Gettysburg on July 2, 1863 once said: "In great deeds, something abides. On great fields something stays. Forms change and pass; bodies disappear, but spirits linger, to consecrate the ground...And reverent men and women from afar, and generations that know us not and that we know not of, are heart-drawn to see where and by whom great things were suffered and done for them...." It is with these words in mind that the history teachers at Olean High, both past and present, remind all of us of the ultimate sacrifices made to defend our freedom and the importance of remembering our past.




