District unites for 'Souper Bowl of Caring'

It takes all of the huskies to pull the sled, and over the past two weeks, the husky sled has been very busy! Olean senior Annie Skrobacz planned and carried out a massive task which called upon OHS Girls' and Boys' JV and Varsity basketball players and coaches, school administration from both public and Catholic schools, pre-kindergarteners through seniors in high school, and church members throughout Olean to band together for the National Souper Bowl of Caring Community of Olean event.

Last summer, Annie began working on the National Souper Bowl of Caring

Olean Event when she sought the support of Olean City Schools' Superintendent, Dr. Colleen Taggerty. Once Annie discussed the project, Dr. Taggerty was more than willing to have Annie present it to the OCSD Board of Education whose members were happy to be a part of a community event which directly benefits Olean

residents.

In order to increase community awareness, Annie spoke to Father Gregory Dobson, pas-



tor of St. Mary of the Angels' Church and Greater Olean Area Council of Churches' member. He agreed to discuss the project with GOACC members; the outpouring of those wanting to help continued to grow when a number of the churches agreed to sponsor food and monetary collections at their churches on Super Bowl Sunday.

Olean Zonta Club contributed \$300 which provided a huge jumpstart to the 2009 drive. OHS social studies teacher Janine Scholla thought it might be a great idea to have the basketball players kick off the annual event with a food drive and cash collection at a home

basketball game. The basketball players, coaches, families, and friends hit the court running with contributions filling the buckets in the gym. Olean City School District students, Southern Tier Catholic School students, and Archbishop Walsh High School students rallied with food drives at their respective schools.

As part of their assessment, Karimah and Melanie also did some research on Queen Liliuokalani's life, explaining how economic imperialism forced her from power. Originally written as a love story, the song became identified with the Queen's love for her Hawaii upon her removal from the throne.

Message from the Superintendent

Community input sought on challenging budget process

During this time of unprecedented financial difficulty, the Olean City School District must continue superior performance in relation to our mission "Home, School and Community Educating for Life." With the current financial status New York State has reduced our aid by \$852,798. The original Federal Stimulus package highlighted Olean as receiving an increase of \$163,700 for Title 1 grants, \$307,400 in the area of Special Education funding, and \$667,000 in Construction for the 2009-10 school year. While these categorical funding increases may help to offset some of our cost increases, we will still face financial hardship over the next two to three years. We will continue to see increases in our overall general operating expenses in areas such as fuel, gas, electric, phone, salaries, health insurance, and pension contributions.

Knowing that we are facing significant increases in operating costs, it becomes essential that we find ways to reduce expenditures for the 2009-2010 and 2010-11 school years. It is critical that we are deliberate in our decisions and sensitive to the intended and unintended outcomes of each of those decisions. We know that the decisions we will make in balancing the budgets will impact our learners for years to come.

Throughout the budget development process, we must communicate openly and frequently. To assist with the District's two-way communication, I invite you to share your thoughts and ideas regarding the budget with me by logging onto our webpage www.oleanschools.org where you will find the Superintendent's Blog under Headlines and Features. Click on the bolded title; Superintendent's Blog-Budget. You will be directed to the Blog where you can post your comments.

To protect the integrity of our readers and learners, each entry will be screened for appropriate language and content prior to being posted for public view. Please be assured that your comments will not be altered in meaning if editing of language or content is necessary.


OHS Winter Weekend includes special dedication

Cafeteria charge procedures reinstated

Please be advised that the cafeteria charge procedures established in March of 2007 will be reinstituted and enforced effective February 2009:

- Students will be allowed no more than three (3) meal (breakfast or lunch) charges
- If a student exceeds three (3) charges they will receive cereal and milk for breakfast and /or a sandwich and white milk for lunch so that no student will go without. Parents will be responsible for the cost of any food that is distributed
- The cashier will issue a "cafeteria charge" notification if there is a charge of any kind. Slips will then be given to the classroom teacher and sent home with the students in grades K-5
- After three (3) charges students in the Middle School and High School will be given a "charge slip"
- Building Principals will contact families directly if procedures are not followed
- We encourage families to pay in advance into their children's lunch account by making checks payable to "Olean School Lunch Fund"

Please help us make sure that your child receives the meal they want and that the District is paid for the food we are providing.

District lists Level 2 and Level 3 sex offenders

The Olean Board of Education has approved a policy that requires all parents be notified of any level 3 sex offenders who are living in our school district. A level 3 offender is the most serious and the "risk" to the community is considered high. Therefore, the District will be using this newsletter to publish the names, addresses and other pertinent information related to the nature of the offense committed by such sex offender.

For the public's convenience, we have established a "link" on the front page of the District's web site <u>www.olean-schools.org</u> with the NYS neighborhood Predator Report. This link takes you to the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services where you can find additional information and the picture of any Level 3 sex offender living in our school district. We believe you have a right to know and we will continue to notify you periodically.

Students had to apply facts from their research to complete an informational sheet about the drug. Students then organized their information, wrote the body, and created their own professional – looking pamphlet. One goal of this project was to use computer technology in both the research and the creation of the pamphlet.





Coach Myers inducted into Wrestling Hall of Fame

On Sunday, March 8, former OHS wrestling coach and physical education teacher Jim Myers will be inducted into the Western New York Wrestling "Hall of Fame." Coach Myers got involved with wrestling in 1970 as a youth volunteer coach and OHS assistant wrestling coach. He became the Huskies' head coach in 1979 and

served in that capacity for 16 years.

Coach Myers helped put Olean wrestling on the map, sending nearly 80 wrestlers to sectional competition, with his 14-1 team in 1981-

82 ranked among the top in the state. His teams won four league titles, one Section VI championship, and were the No. 1-ranked team in the inaugural Times Herald rankings when they went 12-2 during the 1984-85 season.

At OHS he coached 12 state qualifiers with six individuals winning state wrestling titles. Two of his former wrestlers also went on to become NCAA Division I National Champions. Coach Myers was well respected by his players and peers and always represented Olean High School with class and dignity.

Sports Boosters upgrade weight room



Mrs. Gabler's 5th grade class and Mrs. Gaylor's 2nd grade class share stories and activities every Thursday afternoon.






A Visit from a Macaw-Quincy:

Celebrating Black History!


