**Michael S. Witte** has been named Valedictorian of the Class of 2009, ranking 1st in a class of 125 students with an average of 98.112. He is the son of Gilbert and Linda Witte. Graduating with an Advanced Regents Diploma with Honors, Michael's academic program included many advanced and college-level courses: Calculus I and II, Economics, French, English, US History, Psychology, and Sociology.

He is the Recording Secretary for the Model United Nations. He has participated in Knowledge Masters for four years and in the Model United Nations for three years. He is a member of the National Honor Society. He has been a member of the JV and Varsity Soccer Teams for three years. Michael plays the bass clarinet for both concert band and orchestra, and has attended the Houghton College String Festival. Michael has also participated in French Club and the Enchanted Mountain Traveling Soccer Club.

Michael was named a Cattaraugus County Youth Bureau Student of the Week, Business First Special Mention, All-WNY Scholar-Athlete for soccer, and a member of Area All-State Band. 





# Class keeps superintendent connected to students' needs

Imagine, if you will, being a fourteen-year-old freshman at Olean High School; you are beginning what everyone tells you are "four of the most important and best years of your life!" Perhaps you feel as nobody listens to you, understands you, or wonders what you are thinking. Those thoughts would weigh heavily on most of us.

Envision, however, that the most powerful figure in your school district listens to your concerns, asks you how you're doing, and sits directly across from you working for an understanding of your worries, joys, and fears. In fact, the superintendent visits your English 9 classroom on a regular basis. She brings snacks, asks questions, and listens to your ideas. A thought comes to mind, and you share it with her.

The aforementioned scenario occurs on a regular basis in Mrs. Skrobacz's English 9 class during fifth period. Last September, Dr. Taggerty approached Mrs. Skrobacz and asked if there might be a class she could connect with, meet with at least once a month, and work collaboratively in order to meet the needs of the students at OHS. The fifth period students welcomed Dr. Taggerty with open arms.

At first, the students were a little apprehensive about speaking their minds, but soon they found that Dr. Taggerty was going to listen to them. Issues ranged from cell phone usage to the cafeteria offering pizza every Wednesday. Students talked about the possibility of changing the cell phone policy at OHS: they wanted to be able to prove to the staff that the students could be more responsible. They were happy to share that there are healthy lunch choices available. Dr. Taggerty and the freshmen considered the idea of having coffee, hot chocolate, bagels, and more available for the students to purchase before school in the near future. The students envisioned this as sort of a high school café and were very excited about all of the possibilities. The high school café is a consideration which Dr. Taggerty is currently investigating for OHS.

Dr. Taggerty also introduced students to the FISH Philosophy: Be There! Choose Your Attitude! Play! and Make Their Day. The freshmen watched a video about the FISH Philosophy which is based on a group of people who work in a Seattle fish market and incorporate their philosophy into their work day. As a result, they make their jobs fun not only for the employees, but also for those who come to shop at their market! Students were challenged to incorporate the FISH Philosophy into their school lives and at home. Most importantly, the students saw a change in the "Choose Your Attitude" foundation. If you choose to be happy, school can be a little easier; but if you choose to be unhappy, your day will be more strenuous than it needs to be.

For their last meeting, the students surprised Dr. Taggerty with a FISH cake. They thanked her for listening to their thoughts and ideas, providing them with the opportunity to meet with her, and taking a genuine interest in their first year of high school.




# East View Elementary School
