# Special ceremony remembers 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary of 9/11

The Olean City School District recently commemorated the 10th anniversary of the September 11, 2001 attacks on our nation with a remembrance ceremony at Olean High School.

The ceremony, which opened with a presentation of the colors by local members of the military, included members of the OHS chorus and orchestra, along with Summer Rising STAR program students who joined elected officials and local busi-

ness leaders to commemorate the event.

During the ceremony, a special September 11 memorial statue was unveiled in the front lawn of the high school. With the help of some Olean High School art students, the statue was crafted by Dave Poulin of Jamestown, and depicts a fireman and child holding a commemorative piece of steel from the former Twin Towers.

Additionally, Shay Lynch, an Olean High School alumnus who moved to New York City in 1993, conducted the Olean High School orchestra as they played "Remembrance, A Decade," a piece he composed for the ceremony. Commissioned and funded by the Olean City School District Foundation, the piece included approximately 30 instruments with a cello soloist throughout. "While I was listening to it, the music made it come to life," said Dr. Colleen Taggerty, district superintendent. "I

could see the tragedy of the day unfolding through the music. It was very emotional, tremendous."

"The foundation was pleased to fund the commission of this piece by an Olean High School alumnus and played by Olean High School students," said Steve Pancio, president of the board of directors for the Olean City School District Foundation. "The entire ceremony was tremendous and we are proud that we could play a small role in helping to honor the memory of those who

# Taking a proactive approach to unprecedented state scrutiny

At a time when schools are losing aid and a Tax Cap has been imposed, the State has increased its involvement in teacher evaluations and school effectiveness with no meaningful mandate relief in sight. School districts are now required to change the way teachers and principals are evaluated based upon test results and new teaching and leadership standards. New curricula are being introduced, and new assessments will be administered to our students that will align to national standards.

Districts across the State are committing hundreds of personnel hours and tens of thousands of dollars implementing new requirements at a time when faced with unprecedented cuts in personnel and revenue. Never before has public education been under such scrutiny by the government and our local communities. Never before has it been so crucial for us to take a proactive approach in defining the future of the Olean City School District.

With the demands for resources increasing and the revenues slowly eroding, the Board of Education has commissioned The Western New York Educational Service Council to conduct a district-wide feasibility study. The Council will answer the following question: Will the Olean City School District be able to maintain programs, six school buildings, current extracurricular activities, etc... under the financial constraints of increasing costs, less aid, and a tax cap?

The Council plans to present its findings and recommendations to the Board of Education at the January 17, 2012 board meeting.

# Understanding the Tax Cap Law: Part I

In June 2011 New York State passed a tax cap law. A three part series will be completed and published in the next several newsletters, as well as posted on the District's website, that will explain the impact of the law for our taxpayers.

#### **General Information:**

Is the tax cap limited to 2%? NO – The tax levy limitation will be between 1 %– 2% based on the lower of either the Consumer Price index (CPI) or 2%.

**Is this law a flat tax cap?** NO – The law limits the school district tax levy NOT the individual tax bill of resident taxpayers.

Can a school district simply apply 2% to the current levy to determine next year's tax levy? NO – A formula has been supplied by the State to calculate the tax levy limit.

**Does the new law cap the tax increase?**NO – The law sets a new threshold on the tax levy increase.

#### **New Threshold Components:**

What is the first step in calculating the tax levy limit? The District will use the 2011-12 tax levy amount and multiply it by a growth factor to be set by the State.

Can the Olean area have a growth factor based on the current economic state? Yes, all new housing and businesses that were built in the past year are included in the growth factor. This includes renovations made by homeowners.

What are PILOTs? Businesses can apply to the County of Cattaraugus Industrial Development Agency/Resource Corporation to waive their taxes and get a separate agreement to pay taxes through a Payment in Lieu of Taxes (PILOT). The businesses are taken off the tax roll and pay their taxes in accordance with the PILOT agreement for up to 15 years.

Can my taxes go up beyond the 2% cap? YES - With the exceptions added back into the tax levy, the District can increase the tax levy by a maximum of 2% plus add in all of the exceptions noted in the accompanying.

Can the District raise my taxes by more than 2% and still be in compliance with the new law? YES.

<u>As an example</u>: a tax levy increase of 2.66% (or \$343,094.48) would be in compliance under the following set of circumstances:

with the PILOT agreement for up to 15 years. After 15 years has lapsed, the property value goes back into the total tax rolls. **Do PILOTs affect the tax levy limit?** YES - PILOT payments are included in the calculation to determine the tax levy limit.

## Are there any increases in expenses that are outside the tax levy limit? YES What expense exceptions apply to the school?

1. Increases in the Employee and Teacher retirement contribution rate that are above 2%.

For example, the average Employee Retirement System (ERS) rate will increase in 2012-13 by 2.6%. Therefore, a part of the increase to pay for employee retirement will be exempt from the tax levy limit. Following is an example of how this will work:

Total salary paid for employees in Employee Retirement System: \$3,500,000 Times the amount over the 2% increase (2.6-2.0)  $\times 0.006$  Exempt amount \$21,000

This exemption will also apply to the Teacher Retirement System (TRS) contribution rate increase that is projected to be 2.49%.

2. Taxpayer portion of the capital project. Every year the District makes principal and interest payments for the capital project. This payment is made up of building aid and a taxpayer portion. For the current school year, the taxpayer portion is \$84,662 which can be exempt from the tax levy limitation.

# Dignity for All Students Act

The Dignity for All Students Act (DASA) goes into effect on July 1, 2012. This act amends the New York Education Law to prohibit harassment against students in school, including harassment based on real or perceived race, color, weight, national origin, ethnic group, religion, religious practice, disability, sexual orientation, gender (including gender identity and expression) and sex, and to prohibit discrimination based on these same characteristics.



Every student who is entitled to free and reduced meals can eat both breakfast and lunch each day. Price for reduced breakfast is \$.25. Menus are available on the District's website as well as being sent home with elementary students. A main entrée as well as side dishes are available daily. #### Concerning Free and Reduced Priced Meals

#### Reasons Not to Complete an Application:

If you receive a Direct Certification Letter from the Office of Temporary and Disability
Assistance, follow the instructions on the back of that letter then send the original letter to
your child's school, as soon as you get it. The food service department needs this document.

#### Reasons to Complete an Application:

- Your children may receive nutritious breakfasts and lunches each school day at little or no cost to you.
- To avoid unnecessary charges on your child's account, send money to cover your child's purchases, until your new application is processed. We need a new application on file each school year. The applications are dated for a specific school year in the upper right corner. You will receive a Notification of Eligibility Letter from the Olean City School District food service office. Your current year status ended on October 1<sup>st</sup>. If no new application was received by October 1<sup>st</sup>, the child goes back to paid status.
- The number of students eligible for free/reduced meals directly affects state and federal aid received by Olean City School District to support the Olean school's educational programs.

#### Reasons to Contact the Food Service Office Immediately:

- You are receiving notices from the cafeteria or your child tells you that he/she owes money.
- You are receiving phone messages or additional applications from the food service office.
- If your application has been mailed back to you needing more information.
- Any of these actions means your child may be charged for meals until we get the information we need.




# THE ART OF FRENCH PAPER CUTTING

# From the School Resource Officer ...

Schools across America are being bombarded by parent phone calls stemming from Facebook harassment and bully issues.

Good parents are receiving calls from the schools sharing that the school has evidence that their child harassed, bullied, teased, or insulted another child. By law, the school is obligated to investigate the situation once it shows up at school. The evidence usually shows up via a printout brought in by a student to share with more students. For the victim, it's devastating!

#### Six Steps A Parent Can Take To Stop Facebook Bullies

- 1. There is abosolutely no reason for an elementary school child to be alone on Facebook or to have his or her own private account.
- 2. If your middle school or high school student has a Facebook account, you, the parent, should have an account too. Tell your child that they have to "friend you," in order for them to have their own Facebook account.
- 3. All parents must insist on access to their child's Facebook account. This means that you have to have the password to your child's account.
- 4. Let your child know that you will be checking on their site periodically. While checking, click on "Groups" and other areas of your child's site including pictures, comments, and conversations.
- 5. As the parent, you are responsible for your child. This includes their behavior on Facebook. If you see inappropriate behavior coming to your child from others:
  1) remain calm, 2) talk to your child about it, 3) contact the other child's parent- if you know them, 4) contact the school administration if the content (threats, harassment) includes statements/actions that have or will occur at school.

Limit your child's time on Facebook and other social media outlets. Too many children become addicted to these sites and spend less time on more productive areas of their life.



## **Class honors Shirtwaist Factory victims**

On March 25, 1911, a fire broke out at the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory in New York City. All of the exits were locked and the fire escapes were barely attached to the building. As a result, within 18 minutes 146 people were dead, either by falling to their deaths or by the fire itself. It is believed the fire may have been started by a cigarette in a scrap bin that had not been

completely extinguished. The victims were primarily female immigrants from Russia and Italy, some as young as 14. These victims were mothers, children, sisters, wives, brothers, and husbands.

For the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary, the OHS US History and Government classes (Class of 2012) honored these victims by wearing black arm bands, each with a different name and short biography of a Triangle Shirtwaist Factory Fire victim. This experience allowed the students to better understand the need for workplace code enforcement and safety laws, as well as the history of the labor movement in our country. Participatory Government Intern, Madison Ozzella helped to organize the event in order to give her fellow students a better "connection" to our state's and nation's past.
